Aboriginal Music Manitoba is a non-profit organization, governed by an eight-person volunteer Board of Directors. The board members are Alan Greyeyes, Lisa Meeches, Waubgeshig Rice, Jacques St. Goddard, Jamie Isaac, David Robertson, Teresa Clifton, and Kim Ziervogel.

As the Manitoba Aboriginal Music Host Committee Inc, the organization produced Aboriginal nominee honouring ceremonies at the JUNO Awards (2005) and the Western Canadian Music Awards (2006 and 2009), launched the Manito Ahbee Festival and Aboriginal Peoples Choice Music Awards (2006), and produced new Aboriginal music shows for the Cultural Olympiad (2009 and 2010).

Aboriginal Music Manitoba is currently programming Aboriginal Music Week 2010. This will be the second year for the music festival and it will run October 29 – November 7 in venues throughout downtown Winnipeg. Aboriginal Music Week 2009 won a Manitoba Tourism Award for Aboriginal Tourism.
